## ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR AWARD

### DANIEL J. FUSS

COLLEGE OF BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION 1955  
GRADUATE SCHOOL 1966

Dan Fuss is vice chairman of Loomis, Sayles & Co. of Boston, one of the oldest and largest investment management firms in America with offices in 11 cities and \$54 billion under management. Prior to joining the firm in 1976 as vice president and managing partner of its institutional department, Dan was a lieutenant (junior grade) in the U.S. Navy and later became a full lieutenant in the U.S. Naval Reserve. Dan held vice president positions at Continental Illinois National Bank & Trust Co., Endowment Management & Research Co. (where he also was portfolio manager of the Yale Endowment) and The Boston Co. Dan has been a director of the Boston Security Analysts Society since 1998 and was a director of Mutual of America Life Insurance Co. for 10 years. He was a trustee and chair of the Lincoln Filene Center (now known as the University College of Citizenship and Public Service) at Tufts University, a member of the Archdiocese of Boston Justice and Peace Commission and served on the board of the Pope John Medical/Moral Institute. Dan was the distinguished alumnus in the College of Business Administration in 1999 and is a member of The 1881 Society of the Marquette University President's Council.



## ALUMNI MERIT AWARDS FOR PROFESSIONAL ACHIEVEMENT



### KATHLEEN QUINN ABERNATHY COLLEGE OF SPEECH 1982

Kathleen Abernathy was appointed to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) by President George W. Bush in May 2001. As a commissioner, she is responsible for representing the public's interest in each of the policy areas under the FCC's jurisdiction, including broadcast, cable, satellite, domestic and international telecommunications, and wireless telephony. Prior to her FCC appointment, Kathleen served as a vice president at several telecommunications companies, including BroadBand Office Communications Inc., U.S. West Inc. and AirTouch Communications Inc. She was also a partner in the law firm of Wilkinson Barker Knauer and held several positions at the FCC. Kathleen is a member and former president of the Federal Communications Bar Association and a member of the Washington, D.C., Bar. She has also served as an adjunct professor at the Georgetown University Law Center and at Catholic University of America's Columbus School of Law, where she earned her law degree.



### DANIEL J. STEINGER COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES 1967

Dan Steinger is president and CEO of Catholic Knights, chairman of The Catholic Equity Fund and president of the board of Harbor Commissioners for the Port of Milwaukee. Catholic Knights, headquartered in Milwaukee, is the second largest Catholic fraternal organization in North America and was named one of the most outstanding companies to work for by *Milwaukee Magazine*. The Catholic Equity Fund offers individual and institutional investors a mutual fund advocating Catholic values in business. Dan regularly appears at shareholder meetings of major corporations to advocate for reasonable CEO compensation, better corporate governance and the end of human rights abuses. He is the author or co-author of numerous articles, including monographs on Catholic social investing and management theory. Prior to joining Catholic Knights, he practiced law at a Milwaukee law firm and, from 1969-71, served as a teacher in the Peace Corps in Kenya. In 1973, Dan received a law degree from Boston University's School of Law. He has served on numerous other Milwaukee-area nonprofit boards and charitable foundations, including Alverno College, the Pabst Mansion and Artreach Milwaukee, and is president of the Daniel W. Hoan Foundation, which was started by his grandfather, Daniel Hoan, mayor of Milwaukee from 1916-40.



**JUDGE JAMES A. WYNN, JR.**  
LAW SCHOOL 1979

Judge James Wynn serves as a judge of the North Carolina Court of Appeals. The North Carolina Academy of Trial Lawyers honored him as the 1995 Appellate Judge of the Year, and the Baptist Convention of North Carolina recognized him with its MLK Award in 1996. He was one of 20 judges and scientists around the nation recently invited to participate in the Einstein Institute's "Working Conversation on Genetics in the Courtroom for the 21st Century" and is chair-elect of the Appellate Judge's Conference of the American Bar Association. James began his career as a lawyer in the U.S. Navy Judge Advocate General's Corps, earning the Meritorious Service Medal, the Navy Commendation Medal, the National Defense Service Medal and the Naval Reserve Medal. He is a captain in the U.S. Naval Reserve. He has also served as an assistant appellate defender for the state of North Carolina, served one year as an associate justice on the North Carolina Supreme Court, and practiced law privately. He holds a bachelor's degree in journalism from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and an LL.M. degree from the University of Virginia Law School.

Pat Kraninger's 35-year volunteer career on behalf of Marquette encompasses everything from college nights, freshman send-offs and local club events to a variety of alumni leadership roles at the local and national levels. She and her husband, Dave, Eng '68, are the embodiment of a "Marquette couple" and Pat often says she "bleeds blue and gold." Among the highlights of Pat's service to Marquette are her revival of the Marquette Club of Northeast Ohio and her six years of service (two as co-president with her husband) on the board of the Marquette University Alumni Association, culminating with a term as president from 1998-99. Her vision and energy were critical in creating Marquette's annual National Service Day and the Office of Undergraduate Admissions Legacy Program. Pat and Dave are members of The 1881 Society of the Marquette University President's Council, served as giving and attendance co-chairs for their 30th class reunion, and served as giving chairs for their 35th reunion. **JAMES K. MURPHY**  
COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES 1975

Jim Murphy is a partner at TJM Investments L.L.C. and specializes in technology, brokerage and trading in equities, futures and options. He was a member of Chicago Board Options Exchange for 25 years and has served as the chairman of the board's Stock Selection Committee and chair of the Floor Expansion Committee. In memory of his father, Jim co-founded the Daniel Murphy Scholarship Foundation in 1989 and served as president until 1998. Under his leadership, the small scholarship initiative for four schools became Chicago's largest scholarship program for low-income high school students and one of the largest programs in the country. In 2002-03, the program had enrolled 430 students in 65 schools nationwide. In 1996, Jim formed the Chicago Charter School Foundation to meet the educational needs of low-income children from kindergarten through eighth grade and served as president until 2003. The foundation operates seven campuses of the Chicago International Charter School — the largest charter school in the United States — serving 4,800 students. Jim is a founding director of the Heartland Institute, a public policy research organization, and a former board member of the High Jump Educational Program, a high school preparatory program for inner-city youth.

**CHARLES M. SWOBODA**  
COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING 1989

Chuck Swoboda is the president, CEO and a board member of Cree Inc., a publicly traded company headquartered in Durham, N.C.'s Research Triangle. Cree is a leader in the development and manufacture of semiconductor devices based on silicon carbide and gallium nitride. The company's products include blue and green light-emitting diodes, high-power radio frequency and microwave transistors, and other items. Cree employs more than 1,100 people worldwide and has a market capitalization of approximately \$1.3 billion with annual revenues of \$230 million for the most recent fiscal year, a 48 percent increase above the previous year. Cree was recognized as North Carolina's High Tech Company of the Year in 2003 by *North Carolina Business Magazine* and one of North Carolina's Technology Fast 50 for nine consecutive years. *Fortune*, *Forbes*, *Bloomberg*, *Individual Investor* and *Business 2.0* have also recognized Cree for its financial success over the last several years. Chuck joined Cree in 1993 and has served as the CEO since June 2001, as a board member of the board since October 2000, and as president since January 1999. He serves on the College of Engineering National Advisory Council and is a member of The 1881 Society of the Marquette University President's Council.

#### DISTINGUISHED ALUMNA AWARD



#### JUDGE MARILYN H. LOFTUS

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES 1958

Judge Marilyn Loftus retired from the New Jersey Supreme Court Appellate Division in 1997. Admitted to the practice of law in 1961, Marilyn spent 11 years in the New Jersey Attorney General's Office, becoming the state's first female assistant attorney general, and served 24 years on the bench as a county court and superior court judge. After attending a National Association of Women Judges (NAWJ) conference in 1980, she was asked to chair a special task force on women in the courts in the New Jersey judicial system. The task force's presentation to the 1983 New Jersey Judicial College, reported on the front page of *The New York Times*, and its report and recommendations, published in June 1984, galvanized national attention and inspired states across the country to undertake similar investigations. Marilyn chaired the task force (now a standing committee of the New Jersey Supreme Court) on women in the courts for more than 10 years and served as president of NAWJ in 1989, earning a reputation as one of the nation's leading advocates for fairer treatment of women in the legal system. She has been a member of the faculty of the National Judicial College since 1996 and teaches a course in creating a bias-free environment in the courtroom. She is a member of the Marquette University President's Council.

#### CHARLES C. MULCAHY

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES 1959  
LAW SCHOOL 1962

Chas Mulcahy is a senior partner in the Milwaukee office of the law firm Whyte Hirschboeck Dudek and has taught as an adjunct professor in the Law School for 15 years. Chas is past president of the Woolsack Society and the Law School Alumni Association. He has served as the honorary consul of Belgium in Milwaukee since 1985 and played a key role in establishing an exchange program between the University of Antwerp and the College of Business Administration. Chas was made a Knight of the Order of Leopold by King Albert II for his service. He was co-founder and first president of the Wisconsin World Trade Center, a past member of the Milwaukee County Board of Supervisors, past president of the Public Policy Forum and past chairman of the Milwaukee County War Memorial Corp. In athletics, Chas is a member of Marquette's M Club Athletics Hall of Fame and has served as president of the Milwaukee Tennis Classic for 29 years. He serves on the College of Business Administration Dean's Advisory Council and Bell Chair Advisers and is a member of The 1881 Society of the Marquette University President's Council. Chas and his wife, Judy, donated 40 Thai contemporary paintings to Marquette, which are on permanent display in the Alumni Memorial Union.



#### YOUNG ALUMNA AWARD

##### **COLLEEN CARROLL CAMPBELL**

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES 1996

Colleen Campbell is an award-winning journalist who has served as a speech-writer to President George W. Bush. She began her career as a news reporter for the *Memphis Commercial Appeal* and later was a reporter and editorial writer for the *St. Louis Post-Dispatch*. In 2000, she won a Phillips Foundation Journalism Fellowship and spent one year traveling the country chronicling the growing attraction of young adults to traditional Christianity. Her book, *The New Faithful: Why Young Adults Are Embracing Christian Orthodoxy*, was published by Loyola Press in 2002. Since its publication, she has received speaking invitations from institutions across America, including requests to present her research to staff members at the White House and on Capitol Hill, and an appointment as the featured author at the Seminar in American Religion at the University of Notre Dame. She frequently appears on national television and radio shows to discuss issues of religion, politics and culture, and has written for the *Weekly Standard*, *Washingtonian Magazine* and the *Milwaukee Journal Sentinel*, among others. In 2002, she began work toward a doctorate in philosophy at St. Louis University. She interrupted her studies later that year to accept a job as one of six speechwriters to President Bush.



#### A PERSON FOR OTHERS AWARD

##### **BONNIE MCGOWAN BELLEHUMEUR**

COLLEGE OF ARTS AND SCIENCES 1970

Since 1991, Bonnie Bellehumeur has served as the president and CEO of America's Second Harvest of Wisconsin, the state's largest food bank. Second Harvest distributes nearly 13 million pounds of food annually and nearly 300,000 people in 36 counties rely on Second Harvest for food daily. In 1995 and 1997, Bellehumeur was appointed by then-Wis. Gov. Tommy G. Thompson to the Governor's Board on Hunger. In 2000, Bonnie established the separate, for-profit Evoco, which sells prepackaged boxes of food, personal care items, cleaning supplies and school supplies to provide revenue to support the mission of Second Harvest. In 1998, she was honored by the Wisconsin Harvard Business School Alumni Club with a scholarship to attend Harvard Business School to study strategic perspectives for nonprofit management. She was also named a "Woman of Influence" by *The Business Journal* of Milwaukee in 2001. Before joining Second Harvest, she served as a budget analyst and budget director for the state of Wisconsin. She also worked as an administrator for the Milwaukee County Welfare Program and was the executive director for a private special education institution. In addition to her Marquette degree, she earned a master's degree in education and community mental health administration from Northern Illinois University.

Ulice Payne is the former president and CEO of the Milwaukee Brewers Baseball Club. He previously held the position of managing partner at the Milwaukee office of the law firm Foley & Lardner and served as chair of its International Business Team. Redmond Commercial Development Corp, a real-estate development company, is one of the top nationally preferred developers for Walgreen Co. and has completed more than 125 Walgreens stores across the country and developed more than 3 million square feet of commercial and retail space. To manage his growing portfolio of commercial property, Mark created a property management firm, MRED Management, and most recently, he started Redmond Residential of Wisconsin Inc. to provide property development services to the residential construction industry. #### BY-LINE AWARD

##### GREGORY D. STANFORD

Greg Stanford is an editorial writer and columnist for the *Milwaukee Journal Sentinel*. Greg was the editor of the *Soul City Times*, a community newspaper in Milwaukee, from 1968-70 and started at the *Milwaukee Journal* in 1971 as a reporter where, among other assignments, he covered the struggle for equality by African-Americans. He joined the *Journal's* Editorial Board in 1988 and when the *Journal* merged with the *Milwaukee Sentinel* in 1995, he joined the board of the merged papers. Greg has won numerous journalism and community service awards, including a 1993 National Headliner Award for column writing and the 1990 Richard S. Davis Award, the *Milwaukee Journals* highest writing honor. He is a past president of the National Association of Black Journalists/Wisconsin Black Media Association and has taught journalism at the University of Wisconsin — Milwaukee.



#### COMMUNICATOR OF THE YEAR AWARD

##### ANNE KALLIN ZEHREN

COLLEGE OF SPEECH 1984

As publisher of *Teen People* magazine and Teenpeople.com, Anne Zehren oversaw one of the most successful launches in publishing history. *Teen People* became one of the fastest growing and largest selling magazines ever and its record-breaking performance ranked it No. 2 on *Ad Week's* 2002 Hot List. Anne served on President Bill Clinton's Executive Board on Youth Violence and the board of the National Campaign Against Youth Violence. She was honored as Corporate Supporter of the Year by SHINE, a nonprofit organization devoted to combating youth violence through art, music and technology, and received the D.A.R.E. American Spirit Award. *Advertising Age* named her one of the country's "Top 100 Marketers" in 1998 and one of its "Media Mavens" in 2000. In 2001, she was inducted into the Advertising Hall of Achievement. Prior to joining *Teen People*, Anne became the industry's first associate publisher of marketing while at *Glamour*. She also worked at *Newsweek* as director of marketing and for NBC and as director of corporate/employee communications at NBC, where she was nominated for an Emmy Award. A national authority on youth culture, Anne has advised many Fortune 100 companies on how to market to young adults.
