Dr. Julian Hills has been at Marquette University since 1985. He specializes in the New Testament and Christian non-canonical writings, and is currently editing the first North American edition of the apocryphal acts of the apostles. His Harvard University doctoral dissertation was published as *Tradition and Composition in the Epistula Apostolorum* (1990; rev. ed., 2008), and he recently published an annotated translation, from the original Coptic and Ethiopic, of the *Epistle of the Apostles* (2009). His scholarly articles have appeared in leading journals in the field, e.g., *The Journal of Theological Studies*, *The Catholic Biblical Quarterly*, *Revue Biblique*, *Journal for the Study of the New Testament*. An ordained Episcopal priest, Dr. Hills is passionate about the relationship between academic theology and life as lived by “regular folks” both inside and outside the mainstream churches and organized religion.
