

1938–2013

HISTORY

- 1917 non-credit courses offered to women "lab girls" by School of Medicine directed by Dr. Bernard McGrath
- 1925 School of Hospital Administration was organized; medical technology was an elective program conducted at the Medical School and Trinity Hospital
- **1928**
 - School of Hospital Administration closed
 - ASCP Board of Registry for Medical Technologists formed (2 years of college + 1 year internship) for certification eligibility
 - Dr. John Grill, Dept. of Pathology, directed the program; clinical work at St. Joseph's Hospital and Milwaukee County Hospital; no degree granted










- 1938 four-year program officially placed in the College of Nursing; still directed by Dr. Grill
- ▶ 1939 first B.S. degree granted
- **1945**
 - Dr. W.A.D. Anderson, chair of the Dept. of Pathology directed the program; appointed Dr. S.B. Pessin as the program coordinator in 1949 and officially placed the program under the jurisdiction of the medical school





- ▶ 1950 Dr. John Hirschboeck, dean of the Medical School, returned the program to the College of Nursing
- 1954 program returned to the Dept. of Pathology in the Medical School; Miss Marianne V. Schaff appointed program director





1954-1957


- "Mambo, Microbiology and Marianne"
- Background:
 - Parasitology research in Columbia
 - Director of MT training school in MN
- Enrollment was 113
- Stavri Joseph, first male graduate-1956



• 5 more of by 1968

~ a third of majors today





- Certificate program in histology introduced in 1954; yearlong training course with no academic credit given; four students per year; preclinical courses taught in the Department of Pathology and clinical coursework at Milwaukee County and the Veterans Administration Hospital
- Miss Schaff resigned to join the Catholic Mission Sisters; Miss Eileen Esser served as acting director for 1957-58 academic year

1958-1996

- Alice Semrad named program director
- Enrollments reached all-time highs
- New courses added to the curriculum
- Implementation of a medical technology program at UWM in 1963
- Faculty participated in a Peace Corps training program for Brazil
 - Pilot course in summer 1964
 - Complete training program (hematology, parasitology and urinalysis) in summer 1965 and 1966









- Numerous administrative structure changes
 - 1967 Medical School separated from MU
 - 1970 Program removed from Dept. of Pathology
 - 1975 MCW umbrella ceased
 - 1996 College of Health Sciences began
- Awarded an Allied Health Professions Basic Improvement three-year grant in 1967-68; purchased laboratory equipment and developed teaching aids; \$69,475
- Editor of the *Comprehensive Review for Medical Technologists* published in 1975
- \$8 million renovation to the Cramer Building (old Medical School building) in 1978 to expand teaching facilities for medical technology and physical therapy












- The 1980's brought major changes in hospital regulations/structure; hospital laboratory consolidations and closures; limited the number of clinical placements; declining enrollments nationwide
- Name changed to Medical Laboratory Technology in 1990 to define laboratory diagnostic medicine; abbreviation(MLT) confusing; name changed in 1998 to Clinical Laboratory Science
- Alice Semrad Endowed Scholarship established upon her retirement; awards granted to students for past 13 years; will be able to continue this legacy for many years with regular contributions from alumni

1996-2009

- Linda Milson (faculty 1970–73; 1976) named program director
- Clinical sites expanded
- Initiated university program accreditation in 2001 awarded initial 5 year accreditation
- Courses: Concepts in CLLS Medicine, Laboratory Instrumentation and Method

- Co-chair Clinical Laboratory Educators Conference in Milwaukee - 2004
- President ASCLS-WI and Member of the Year in 2008
- Co-Chair of ASCLS State Revitalization Task Force in 2008-09



2009-Present

- Dr. Linda J. Laatsch, faculty member since 1976, named program director
- Specialty in Microbiology
- Outstanding Young Educator by the Milwaukee Jaycees in 1984
- Conceived of and developed Public Health course in 2002; received an MU Urban-Directed Curriculum Enhancement Grant to assist in the course development
- Received a Distinguished Service to Public Health Award from the Wisconsin Public Health Association in 2011













- Recipient of the John P. Raynor, S.J. Faculty Award for Teaching Excellence in 2007
- President of MSMT and ASCLS-WI and Member of the Year in 2007
- Chair of the ASCLS Promotion of the Profession Committee

Innovative recruitment strategy to address declining enrollments in

university-based programs

First offered 1986-87 fall semester

Three-day Saturday course for high school students

Diabetes serves as the case study

- Chemistry and urinalysis on day 1
- Hematology on day 2
- Microbiology on day 3



Laboratory Medicine is essential to healthcare

Currently enrolled CLS students serve as laboratory assistants

>1000 students have completed the course

~5% have chosen CLS as their college major

Laboratory results produced by Clinical Laboratory Scientists influence 70% of medical decisions



ALPHA DELTA THETA $A\Delta\Theta$

- First national medical technology sorority
- Founded on February 1, 1944 at the University of Minnesota
- Marquette designated the Alpha chapter and Minnesota the Beta chapter
- First national convention in November 1944
- Official publication, the Scope, was published four times a year
- December 1974, Alpha chapter became inactive; students organized an active group within the professional society to continue service work and live out Marquette's mission

PROFESSIONAL DEDICATION

- The junior class of 1958-59 conceived the idea
- A religious experience was the central theme
- First dedication ceremony took place May 17, 1959 with the celebration of the Mass in the Medical School Auditorium; seniors pinned badges on the white uniforms of the juniors
- Honors banquet and awards ceremony followed later in the day at the Astor Hotel
