YOUR JOURNEY

According to the 2010-11 edition of the Bureau of Labor and Statistics' *Occupational Handbook*, the job outlook is favorable to excellent in law enforcement and corrections through 2018. Police and detective positions are expected to increase by 10 percent, correctional officer positions 9 percent, and probation/parole officer positions by 19 percent. Promotions and pay increases are most favorable for those with advanced training, the handbook says. Position yourself to take advantage of these opportunities by enhancing your leadership and management skills.

Certificate

Course work:

- Students must complete 12 credit hours (four classes) online, including:
 - Policies in policing
 - Legal issues in law enforcement
 - Economics and budgeting policing
 - Police leadership and ethics
- The courses are offered over the span of a semester.
- All course work is completed online.
- Students complete assignments independently and in small groups.

Time to completion:

- Students typically complete the program in one to two years.

YOUR INVESTMENT

Furthering your education is an investment you can count on. Financial aid — in several forms — can help meet the costs of your graduate education at Marquette.

Tuition*

For part-time students:

Tuition is \$945 per credit hour. One course is equivalent to three credits. Average cost per semester is \$2,835.

A minimum of 12 credit hours is required to complete the program.

*Figures are based on average credit hours taken per semester and exclude service fees and/or continuous enrollment/continuation course fees. Per-credit cost valid until May 2012.

Need-based aid

Enroll as a half- or full-time student in a degree program (at least four credit hours, usually two or more classes a semester), and you may be eligible for loans distributed through the Office of Student Financial Aid. Most student loans have competitive interest rates and do not require repayment until after you complete your course of study.

To apply, file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid each year between January 1 and mid-February. It's available from the Office of Student Financial Aid or at fafsa.ed.gov. Once you have been admitted to your program and completed your financial aid paperwork, we will determine your eligibility and send you a notice explaining what financial aid you are eligible to receive from the university.
