## Meet Our Speakers

### John J. DeGioia, Ph.D.



John J. “Jack” DeGioia, Ph.D., made history when he became Georgetown University’s 48th president in July 2001, the first lay president of the 212-year-old Jesuit university.

“I have been taught that the laity must be prepared to assume greater responsibility in partnership with the clergy as stewards of the Catholic and Jesuit university and the Church itself,” DeGioia says. “From the day I walked onto this campus in 1975, I have been a member of a community that acknowledged as part of its corporate responsibility the preparation for a future in which the role of the laity would become even greater.”

In the late 1970s, while earning a bachelor’s degree in English from Georgetown, he participated in sports, volunteered with the developmentally disabled, and worked as a resident assistant.

DeGioia began his professional career at Georgetown after graduating in 1979. He held various leadership positions throughout the university for more than two decades before being named president.

This long-time administrator understands classroom issues firsthand. DeGioia has served as a faculty member in Georgetown’s Department of Philosophy and has taught undergraduate philosophy courses every year since receiving his doctorate from Georgetown Graduate School of Arts and Sciences in 1995.

DeGioia and his wife, Theresa Miller DeGioia, have a son, John Thomas, who was born in June 2001.

### Maureen A. Fay, O.P., Ph.D.



When the Jesuit University of Detroit consolidated with Mercy College in 1990, the new president was neither a member of the Society of Jesus nor the Religious Sisters of Mercy. For the past 14 years, the University of Detroit Mercy has been guided by Maureen Fay, O.P., Ph.D., a member of the Dominican Sisters of Adrian, Mich.

After a successful career in teaching and academics, Sister Fay served as the first non-Mercy president of Mercy College from 1983 to 1990. In another first, when the two schools joined in 1990, she was the first non-Jesuit president of a Jesuit college or university in the United States.

Since becoming president of the University of Detroit Mercy in 1990, Sister Fay has focused on the growth and revitalization of the school, Michigan’s largest, most comprehensive Catholic university, enrolling approximately 6,000 students.

A native of Chicago, she received a master of arts degree from the University of Detroit in 1966 before earning her doctorate in social sciences at the University of Chicago in 1976.

She is active in many Detroit-area community and civic organizations as well as a number of educational organizations. In March 1996, she was appointed to the Greater Downtown Partnership Inc., an initiative to spearhead downtown economic revitalization and development.

# Marquette University Panel

## Charles Clausen



Charles "Chuck" Clausen's life has been a journey of service. In between earning his bachelor's degree from Marquette in 1963 and his graduation from Marquette Law School in 1970, Clausen spent four years in the Marines, including a tour in Vietnam.

The next 31 years of his life were spent as a member of the Law School faculty. In later years at Marquette, he created and staffed a Law School clinic for the elderly, serving low-income inner-city residents in the neighborhood surrounding the Marquette campus.

Clausen served as executive director of the House of Peace Community Center from 2000-03. This inner-city ministry, sponsored by the Capuchin Franciscans and located a mile north of Marquette, offers city residents access to a food pantry, clothing bank, emergency funds, and legal and nursing services.

## Karen Ivantic-Doucette



Health care with a global impact is a key focus of Karen Ivantic-Doucette. A clinical assistant professor at Marquette College of Nursing, Ivantic-Doucette is a nurse practitioner with 18 years of experience caring for HIV/AIDS patients.

She began treating HIV/AIDS patients in 1986 while working as a home-care nurse. A founding member of Milwaukee's AIDS task force, Ivantic-Doucette was instrumental in founding the Positive Health Clinic. In partnership with the East African Jesuits, she has also directed a USAID training project for nurses and community health workers in Kenya and Uganda.

Today, Ivantic-Doucette divides her time between teaching, working on a project through Marquette to deliver training and medicine to AIDS patients and caregivers in Kenya, and treating HIV-positive patients in Milwaukee. She has served as a member of the White House Presidential Advisory Council on HIV/AIDS since 2002.

## Joyana Jacoby, Arts '04



Joyana Jacoby's life was changed last spring after an immersion experience studying and working with the poor in El Salvador. Jacoby, who graduated from Marquette last week with degrees in theology and sociology, grew up in Stevens Point, Wis. As an undergraduate, she focused on Hispanic ministry and issues of hunger and homelessness. She is a retreat leader and a member of JUSTICE, and she was instrumental in initiating Marquette's new interdisciplinary minor in justice and peace. During the summer, Jacoby has volunteered in Appalachia and with the Claretian Summer Ministry program in Chicago's inner city. In April, Joyana received an award from Marquette University's Office of Student Development for Outstanding Contributions to Spiritual Development and Justice Education. She is the 2004 recipient of the Association of Marquette University Women's Ignatian Leadership Award.

As lay people continue to grow in their service to the world, the Society of Jesus will find opportunities for cooperation with them reaching far beyond our present experience. We will be stretched in our creativity and energy to serve them in their ministry.

## Greg Boyle, S.J.



Rev. Greg Boyle, S.J., likes to quote St. Francis of Assisi: "Preach the Gospel at all times. If necessary, use words." Father Boyle takes those words to heart serving some of the poorest young men and women in East Los Angeles.

Father Boyle was ordained a Jesuit priest in 1984. He is the founder/director of Jobs for a Future/Homeboy Industries, an employment referral center and economic development program for at-risk and gang-involved youth, located in the Boyle Heights area of Los Angeles.

His commitment to his ministry is captured in his view of the Gospel: "Jesus doesn't say, 'He was in jail and you visited *him*.' He says, '*I* was in jail and you visited *me*.' There is no *us* and *them*," Father Boyle adds. "We don't cast out demons — we cast out demonizing."

A native of Los Angeles, he graduated from Gonzaga University and received master's degrees from Loyola Marymount University and the Weston School of Theology and an STM degree from the Jesuit School of Theology at Berkeley. He served as pastor of Dolores Mission in one of the poorest neighborhoods in Los Angeles for six years before helping to found Homeboy Industries.

Father Boyle has taught at Loyola High School, worked with Christian Base Communities in Cochabamba, Bolivia, and served as chaplain of the Islas Marias Penal Colony in Mexico and also at Folsom Prison in California.

## Mary Maxwell



The dry humor and quick wit of Mary Maxwell have made her a popular speaker for more than 30 years. A descendent of Omaha's Creighton family, Maxwell is a native-born Omahan and holds a bachelor's degree from Rosary College (now known as Dominican University) in River Forest, Ill., where she majored in philosophy and Latin and minored in Greek. She can't remember why.

Long familiar with the Society of Jesus, Maxwell and her husband, Charles F. "Chuck," and several of their five children have been employed by or educated by Jesuit schools in Omaha.

Professionally, she was vice president of Clark Eide Inc., a financial services company, until she retired in June 2000. But it is her less serious side that has earned her speaking invitations from around the country. She is especially popular with Jesuit-connected events and her speaking engagements have included appearances at Creighton University, Creighton Prep, Heartland-Delta

III and the Ignatian Spirituality Conference in St. Louis.

Maxwell is passionately devoted to Nebraska football and has been a long-time season-ticket holder. She was placed under a doctor's care after the 2002 season.

Over the years, she has been active in a number of organizations focusing on education and the arts, and has completed two terms on the juvenile court nominating commission in Omaha's Douglas County.

Mary is back by popular demand after a wonderful talk at Heartland-Delta III.

## Alice Bourke Hayes, Ph.D.



As a scientist, Alice Bourke Hayes is a published scholar and the author of numerous books and articles. As an educator, she has been recognized across the country for her leadership in Catholic higher education.

In July 2003, Hayes retired as president of the University of San Diego, a private Catholic university of more than 7,000 undergraduate students. She joined USD in 1995, after six years as executive vice president/provost and professor of biology at Saint Louis University. Hayes spent 27 years at Loyola University Chicago, beginning in a position in the Natural Science Department and leaving as vice president for academic affairs.

A native of Chicago, she received a bachelor's degree in biology from Mundelein College and a master's degree in botany from the University of Illinois at Urbana Champaign, where she was named a University Fellow in Botany. Hayes earned her doctorate at Northwestern University, where she was named a National Science Foundation Fellow.

A passionate advocate for Catholic higher education, Hayes has published widely as a Catholic university administrator. She has been recognized for her work in Catholic higher education with honorary doctorates from Loyola University Chicago, Fontbonne College, Mount St. Mary's College and Saint Louis University.

A community leader who has served on a number of civic, corporate and university boards, she has been recognized for leadership and service in San Diego, on the West Coast and across the country.

# History of the Heartland-Delta Gatherings

Until the end of the Second World War, Jesuit colleges and universities in the United States were much smaller than they are today, and many of the faculty and administration were themselves Jesuits. A quarter century later, the scene had changed dramatically. The schools were much larger and served many more students, Jesuits constituted a minority of the faculty and administration, and there was much less of a sense that these 28 institutions were part of a whole, sharing a common identity and purpose.

By the late 1970s, steps were initiated to restore a sense of commonality among these schools as a nationwide learning community. The first full-scale meeting, Assembly '89, drew representatives from throughout the American Jesuit landscape to Georgetown University, the eldest of the 28 institutions, on its 200th birthday. Renewed with a sense that Jesuit higher education in the United States was a whole greater than the sum of its parts, those in attendance at Assembly '89 planned regional follow-up meetings.

In 1994, nine Midwest schools assembled at Loyola University Chicago for Jesuit Higher Education in the Heartland, Heartland I. Three years later, Saint Louis University hosted Heartland II as the membership list grew to 11 institutions and expanded beyond the Midwest.

When the next meeting was hosted at Creighton University in Omaha in 2000, a dozen colleges and universities gathered and the name was changed to Heartland-Delta III to reflect the growing presence of schools in the South and in Belize. Heartland-Delta IV marks the 10th anniversary of these regional gatherings, which have contributed so much to the future of Jesuit education in the United States.

Perhaps most important, we join with [our lay colleagues] in companionship: serving together, learning from and responding to each other's concerns and initiatives, dialoguing with one another on apostolic objectives.

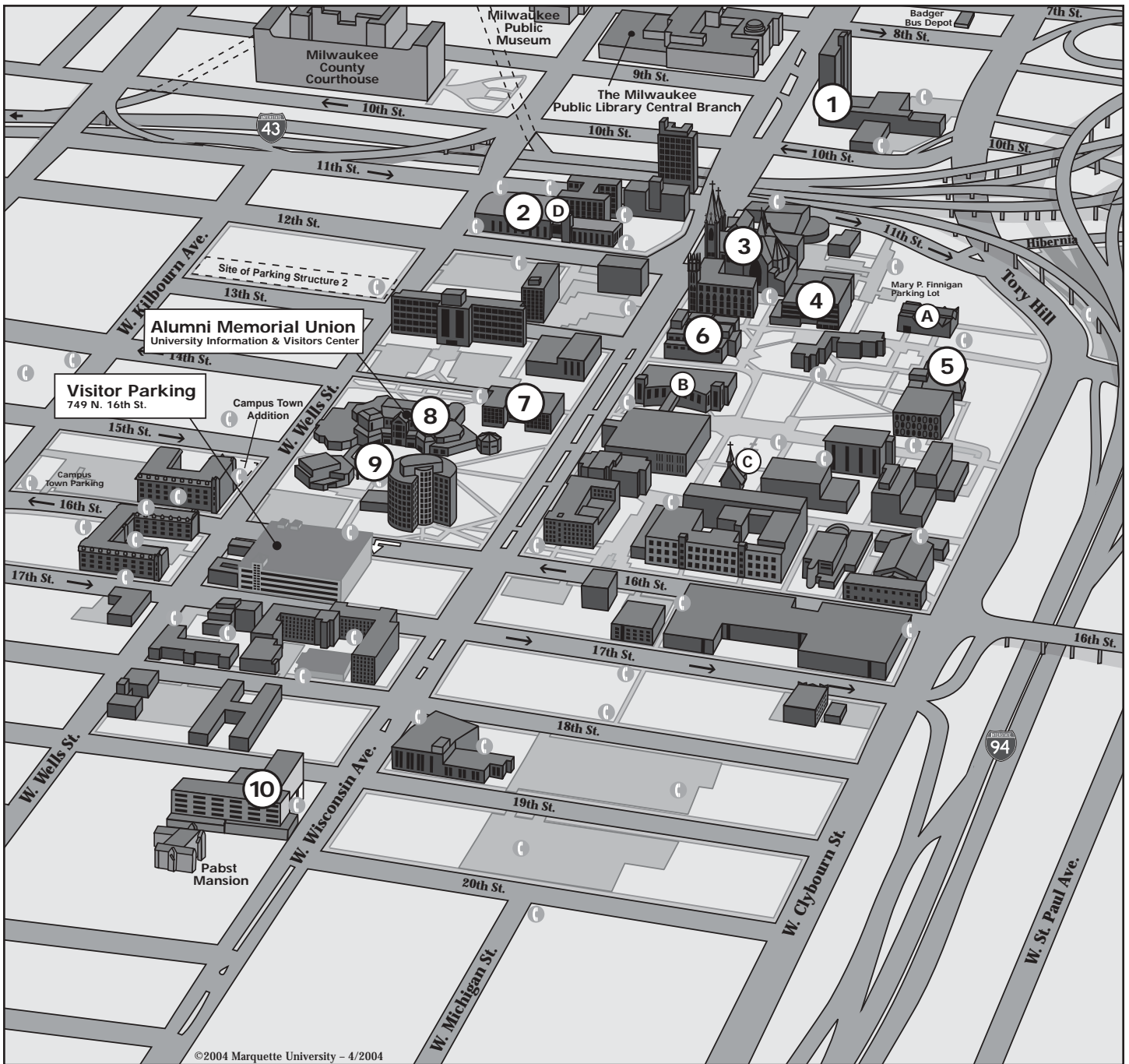
