The Bible says, "Greater love hath no man than to lay down his life for a friend." As we remember those lost service men and women on Memorial Day, let us keep this in mind: Every one of them was protecting a friend friend...protecting a family...back home.

They were serving their nation, yes. But it was the memory of their families and loved ones back home that sustained their spirit in battle...that drove them to do their duty.

That is the greatest love...the greatest service...the greatest duty...and we deeply thank every soldier who has laid down his life for his friends.

But let us not forget that Memorial Day is also a celebration of the profound sense of duty displayed by all of our service men and women. This sense of duty is an integral part of what you learn here at St. John's and Northwestern. Let that sense of duty instill in you an abiding appreciation for our service men and women.

It may inspire you to military service in the glorious tradition of duty we honor on Memorial Day. If you choose that path, I just want to leave you with this thought: on Memorial Day, as we pay tribute to the memory of the valor of our war heroes -- and every last soldier is a hero -- Always remember who you are doing this for.
