THANK YOU, TERRY (Sec. Mulcahy) FOR THE KIND INTRODUCTION. IT'S GREAT TO BE HERE IN EDGAR.

I WANT TO THANK ALL OF YOU FOR COMING HERE TO CELEBRATE THE COMPLETION OF THIS 14-YEAR BUILDING PROJECT TO UPGRADE HIGHWAY 29.

THE FATHER OF OUR COUNTRY, GEORGE WASHINGTON, KNEW A THING OR TWO ABOUT BUILDING THINGS. HE SAID "UNDERTAKE NOT WHAT YOU CANNOT PERFORM, BUT BE CAREFUL TO KEEP YOUR PROMISE."

WELL, WE HAVE KEPT OUR PROMISE TO REPLACE WHAT USED TO BE CALLED "BLOODY 29" -- WITH A SAFE, EFFICIENT, FOUR-LANE HIGHWAY. AND WE HAVE DONE IT ON TIME AND UNDER BUDGET.

I REMEMBER WHEN FORMER TRANSPORTATION SECRETARY RON FIEDLER AND I WERE STANDING ON A PLATFORM LIKE THIS A FEW YEARS AGO, AND RON INDICATED THE ROAD WOULD BE OPEN

IN THE YEAR 2002.

WELL, THAT WASN'T GOOD ENOUGH. I CAME TO THE PODIUM AND PROMISED THE ROAD WOULD BE OPEN IN 2000. I WISH RON COULD HAVE JOINED US TODAY TO SEE US KEEP OUR PROMISE.

A LOT OF PEOPLE DESERVE THANKS FOR HELPING MAKE THIS PROJECT BECOME REALITY, INCLUDING:

- CONGRESSMAN OBEY, FOR HIS CONTINUED EFFORTS TO HELP US COMPLETE THIS PROJECT;
- BILL FUNG OF THE FEDERAL HIGHWAY ADMINISTRATION FOR HIS HELP ALONG THE WAY;
- SENATORS ZIEN, BRESKE AND DECKER AND REPRESENTATIVES SUDER AND PETROWSKI FOR THEIR LEGISLATIVE SUPPORT;
- MAYOR (LINDA) LAWRENCE OF WAUSAU AND MAYOR (PAUL) JADIN OF GREEN BAY, WHO ARE HERE, AS WELL AS MAYOR (VIRGINIA) SMITH OF

I'D ALSO LIKE TO THANK CORA VANDERPERREN (VAN-dur-PEAR-en), THE WIFE OF FORMER REPRESENTATIVE 'CONCRETE' CLETE VANDERPERREN, FOR COMING TODAY. IT'S GOOD TO SEE YOU CORA. WE ALL DEEPLY MISS CLETE. THIS HIGHWAY IS PART OF HIS LEGACY.

BEFORE I STARTED THIS JOB 14 YEARS AGO, WISCONSIN'S HIGHWAYS WERE IGNORED -- AND OUR ECONOMY, AND THE SAFETY OF OUR CITIZENS, WERE SUFFERING FOR IT. IF MAYOR JADIN WANTED TO WATCH THE PACKERS BEAT THE VIKINGS IN MINNEAPOLIS TEN YEARS AGO, HE HAD TO RISK HIS LIFE ON A CONGESTED, TWO-LANE HIGHWAY 29 TO GET THERE. IT WAS THE SAME IN MANY PARTS OF THE STATE NOT LINKED BY THE INTERSTATE HIGHWAY SYSTEM.

THAT'S WHY WE CREATED CORRIDORS 2020, WITH THE GOAL OF ATTRACTING BUSINESS AND COMMERCE, AND IMPROVING HIGHWAY SAFETY.

THE 29 COALITION WAS FORMED, AND PHIL SCHERER AND THE TRANSPORTATION DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION GOT INVOLVED.

PHIL, BOB WAGNER AND RENEE DANIELS WORKED TO KEEP THE COALITION INFORMED AND TO HELP

IT NAVIGATE THE PROCESS OF GETTING THE PROJECT DESIGNED AND KEEPING IT FUNDED.

WE LISTENED TO THE SCORES OF PEOPLE WHO FOUGHT TO MAKE THE HIGHWAY SAFER.
AND WE MADE A PROMISE TO IMPROVE HIGHWAY 29 FROM GREEN BAY TO CHIPPEWA FALLS BY THE END OF 2000. WE'RE HERE TODAY TO TELL YOU – WE KEPT OUR PROMISE.

THE HIGHWAY 29 IS HOME TO NEARLY 20 PERCENT OF THE STATE'S POPULATION AND JOBS. IT'S ALSO WHERE ABOUT 16 PERCENT OF ALL TOURISM SPENDING IS MADE.

MAYOR LAWRENCE TOLD ME EARLIER THAT COMPLETION OF THIS NEW HIGHWAY PUTS WAUSAU AT THE CROSSROADS OF THE STATE. BECAUSE OF THAT, SHE'S LOOKING FORWARD TO SEEING A BOOM IN WAUSAU'S ECONOMY.

MAYOR SMITH ECHOED THOSE COMMENTS, NOTING THAT CHIPPEWA FALLS SERVES AS THE GATEWAY TO NORTHWESTERN WISCONSIN. SHE SEES NOTHING BUT OPPORTUNITY FOR HER COMMUNITY.

MAYOR JADIN STARTED HIS CAREER IN WAUSAU AND TOLD ME THAT HE SPENT MANY WEEKENDS DRIVING BACK AND FORTH TO GREEN BAY ON HIGHWAY 29. HE'S PLEASED TO WITNESS THE COMPLETION OF A MUCH SAFER ROAD.

WE'RE ALREADY SEEING THE ECONOMIC BENEFITS FROM THE IMPROVEMENTS COMPLETED EARLIER:

 PEOPLE LIKE BOB DINKEL (CENEX) AND LEN LECHLEITNER (LECK'-LIGHT-NER) (SNACK SHACK) AND OTHERS LIKE THEM TOOK THE INITIATIVE TO OPEN NEW BUSINESSES THROUGHOUT THE CORRIDOR.

- THE DEPARTMENT OF TOURISM IS ALREADY PROMOTING DESTINATIONS ALONG HIGHWAY 29 TO POTENTIAL VISITORS.
- WE'RE SEEING NEW MOTELS AND MANUFACTURING PLANTS GENERATING MILLIONS OF DOLLARS IN INVESTMENTS AND THOUSANDS OF JOBS.
- THESE NEW BUSINESSES AND JOBS HAVE LED TO MORE NEW HOMES BEING BUILT IN STANLEY, ABBOTSFORD, COLBY AND WITTENBERG.
- THIS INCREASING POPULATION BASE MEANS A GROWING BUILDING TRADES SECTOR ... AND EVEN MORE JOBS IN SHAWANO, GREEN BAY AND CHIPPEWA FALLS.

THIS TOO, IS A PROMISE KEPT ... THE PROMISE OF JOBS, ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY, AND A GREAT FUTURE, NOT ONLY FOR NORTHERN AND CENTRAL WISCONSIN, BUT ALL OF WISCONSIN.

BUT OUR INVESTMENT WOULD MEAN NOTHING, IF IT MEANT PEOPLE CONTINUED LOSING THEIR LIVES ON A DANGEROUS HIGHWAY. ON OLD 29, PEOPLE WERE DYING IN CRASHES AT A RATE MUCH HIGHER THAN AVERAGE FOR SIMILAR HIGHWAYS.

THANKS TO ADDED LANES, GRADUAL CURVES, FLATTER HILLS, AND IMPROVED VISION AT INTERSECTIONS, WE HAVE MADE IT A MUCH SAFER HIGHWAY.

WE'RE ALSO MAKING IMPROVEMENTS IN TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT. FIVE OF THE 14 NEW STATE TROOPER POSITIONS APPROVED IN THE LAST STATE BUDGET HAVE BEEN ASSIGNED TO PATROL THIS CORRIDOR – ONE FOR EACH OF THE FIVE COUNTIES FROM GREEN BAY TO CHIPPEWA FALLS.

WE DID OUR BEST TO LIMIT THE PROJECT'S ARCHEOLOGICAL AND ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT, FROM RECOVERING AND PRESERVING ARTIFACTS TO RELOCATING SNUFF BOX MUSSELS IN THE WOLF RIVER, BUILDING A NEW CONDOMINIUM FOR A NESTING PAIR OF BALD EAGLES, AND PLANTING NATIVE GRASSES AND WILDFLOWERS.

WE CONVERTED MORE THAN 400 ACRES OF LAND AT THE OLD CLARK COUNTY HEALTH CARE CENTER INTO A DIVERSE BIOLOGICAL SETTING.
THIS PROJECT CREATED MORE THAN 600 ACRES OF NEW WETLANDS TO REPLACE THE 400 ACRES THAT WERE FILLED IN.

ANOTHER REASON TO TRAVEL THIS CORRIDOR IS ALSO HERE TODAY. PART OF WHAT MAKES THIS STATE SO GREAT ARE THE NATIVE AMERICAN TRIBES, LIKE THE MENOMINEE, THAT HAVE CALLED IT HOME FOR CENTURIES.

AS PART OF TODAY'S CEREMONY, I WOULD LIKE TO PRESENT AN EXHIBIT ON BEHALF OF THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION TO THE TRIBE.

WOULD CHAIRMAN APESANAHKWAT (AP-ah SAHN-ah KWAT) OR VICE CHAIRMAN BARBARA FRECHETTE-KELLY (Frah-SHET-e KEL-lee) PLEASE COME UP TO THE PODIUM?

THIS EXHIBIT IS PRESENTED TO THE MENOMINEE INDIAN TRIBE OF WISCONSIN AS A TRIBUTE TO THEIR WISCONSIN HERITAGE.
THE DISPLAY ILLUSTRATES THE TRADITIONAL USE OF STURGEON IN THE MENOMINEE CULTURE. THE TRIBE WILL USE THIS TO SHARE ITS CULTURE IN CLASSROOMS ACROSS THE STATE.

(UNVEIL THE PANEL - Shake hands with Chairman Apesanahkwat for photo-op, then Chairman Apesanahkwat returns to his seat. He may wish to say a few words in appreciation of the panel, but his remarks should be brief.)

HIGHWAY 29 HAS ALWAYS BEEN IMPORTANT TO CENTRAL WISCONSIN. WITH ITS COMPLETION WE MARK THE BEGINNING OF A SAFE, NEW, CHAPTER IN THE HISTORY OF THIS STATE.

THANK YOU FOR TAKING THE TIME TO COME OUT TODAY, AND THANKS TO ALL THE PEOPLE RESPONSIBLE FOR COMPLETING THIS PROJECT. CONGRATULATIONS ON A JOB WELL DONE!
