History:

1873	Bishop Isidore Clut, O.M.I. and Oblates of Mary Immaculate visited St. Michael (Eskimo) from Victoria, British Columbia, Canada
1877-1899	Jesuits (Turin Province) visited St. Michael (Eskimo)
ca. 1900-1980	Jesuits (formerly Turin, Canadian, and California; now Oregon Province, Portland, Oregon) established and administered St. Michael's Mission (Eskimo), St. Michael
1908-1918	Ursulines (Western Province, Santa Rosa, California) established and administered St. Ursula's-by-the-Sea Mission School (Eskimo), St. Michael
1980-1999	Became a parish; diocesan priests administered St. Michael's
1999-present	A lay administrator has administered St. Michael's

1904-1910 (closed)	Chenilia station (Eskimo)
1904-1910 (closed)	Kliketari station (Eskimo)
1904-1910 (closed)	Pastolic station (Eskimo)
1904-1910 (closed)	Picmetallic station (Eskimo)
1904-1910 (closed)	Stebbins/ Steben station (Eskimo)
1908-1999 (became a parish)	St. Bernard Mission (Eskimo), Stebbins
1910 (closed)	Unalakleet station (Eskimo)
1949-1987 (transferred to St. Joseph's, Nome), 1999-present	Holy Angels Chapel (Eskimo and Koyukon), Unalakleet
1960-1969 (became a parish)	St. Joseph Mission (Eskimo), Kotlik
