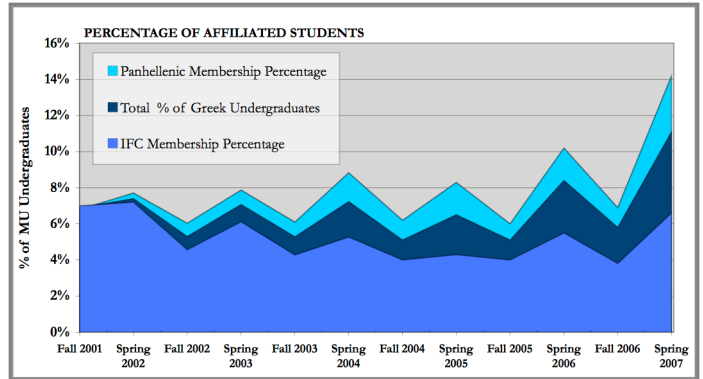
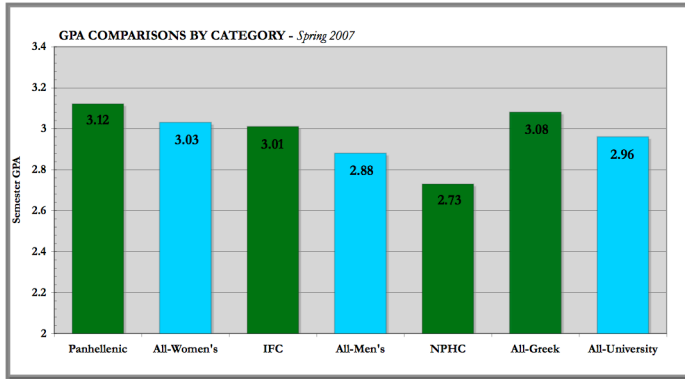


# MARQUETTE UNIVERSITY GREEK REPORT – Spring 2007



## SCHOLARSHIP

- Interfraternity Council GPA higher than All-Men's GPA.
- Panhellenic Association GPA higher than All-Women's GPA.
- All-Greek GPA is higher than All-University GPA.
- Panhellenic GPA is higher than All-Women's GPA 5 of last 6 semesters.
- Eleven organizations had GPA's higher than the all-University average (2.96).
- The IFC created a Scholarship Chair position who develops incentive programs and enforces the new IFC Scholarship Policy.

## MEMBERSHIP

- 669 of Marquette's undergraduates are members of social Greek-letter organizations. This number reflects 11.1% of undergraduates.
- 14.2% of women are Greek; by comparison, this figure was 10.2% at this time last year.
- 6.6% of men are Greek; by comparison, this figure was 5.5% at this time last year.
- Sigma Lambda Gamma sorority was granted their charter by their national headquarters after three years as a colony.

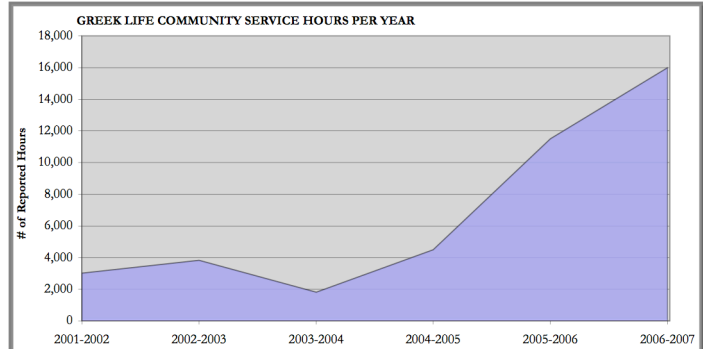
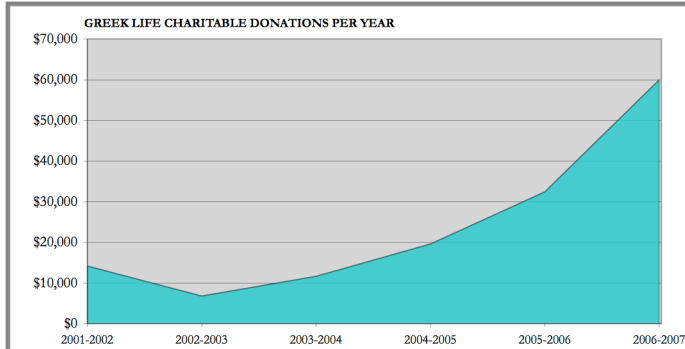

## PHILANTHROPY

- Greeks raised and donated approximately \$60,000 to local and national charities this academic year; an increase of over \$27,000 from last year and an increase of over \$48,000 compared to three years ago.
- Of note are the contributions from Alpha Xi Delta, who donated \$25,000 to various agencies, with a focus on the "First Book" program, which connected chapter members with students to support literacy and excitement for reading.

## SERVICE

- Chapter service projects resulted in a total of approximately 16,000 hours of service to the Marquette and the greater Milwaukee communities; this is an increase of approximately 4,500 hours compared to last year.
- Important to note that on Oct. 28, 2006 approximately 250 Marquette Greeks volunteered for Make a Difference Day. Their commitment to service in Milwaukee was recognized with an honorable mention award and write-up in the April 15 issue of *USA Weekend*.

### **EDUCATION**

- Chapter officers implemented more than 25 educational programs for their membership on topics including: resume writing, financial planning after college, core values, leadership training, breast cancer awareness, Middle Eastern studies, domestic violence, healthy living through yoga, friendship on a multicultural campus, the use of the "N" word, suicide prevention, risk management, and job interview techniques.
- Over 200 students participated in OSD-sponsored New Member Conferences on topics including shattering Greek stereotypes, the significance of chapter ritual, living the values of the organizations, accountability of peers and using campus resources.

### **CAMPUS INVOLVEMENT**

- 84% of Greek members reported involvement in other campus organizations and 32% serve in campus leadership roles outside of the Greek community.
- Members of Greek organizations serve in a variety of leadership positions on campus, including student organization and honor society presidents, MUSG President, MUSG Legislative Vice-President, Commissioners and Senators, Orientation Planning Team Members, Global Village Ambassador, numerous Resident Assistants, Eucharistic Ministers, Arts & Sciences Student Council, Tribune Account Executive, ROTC, and many participate in Marquette service projects such as Midnight Run, Al's Run, and Hunger Clean-up.

### **ORGANIZATION CONDUCT**

- Delta Chi was found responsible for hosting an unregistered party and serving hard alcohol; they were fined a total of \$270 and instructed to develop and present a risk management seminar to IFC and Panhellenic chapters.
- Sigma Kappa was found responsible for hosting an unregistered party and subsequently fined \$150 and instructed to give a risk management presentation for their chapter.
- Triangle was fined a total of \$130 for two separate instances of not providing paperwork in accordance with the IFC/Panhellenic Risk Management Policy.
- Alpha Xi Delta was fined \$25 for not providing paperwork in accordance with the IFC/Panhellenic Risk Management Policy for an event on November 10, 2006.
- Alpha Chi Omega was fined \$25 for not providing paperwork in accordance with the IFC/Panhellenic Risk Management Policy for an event on December 2, 2006.
- Delta Chi was fined \$330 for hosting an unregistered party and not providing paperwork in accordance with the IFC/Panhellenic Risk Management Policy for an on April 29, 2007 event.
- Sigma Phi Epsilon headquarters staff conducted a membership review after receiving potential violations of University and chapter policies. This review resulted in the removal of 26 members, leaving 4 members who have been rebuilding the fraternity. Sigma Phi Epsilon remains a recognized student organization on campus, but will be on University probation for three semesters.
- The Interfraternity Council and Panhellenic Association have been instructed by the Office of Student Development to revise and improve their judicial processes for member organizations. Areas for review include board composition, selection and training; hearing procedures; outcome and sanction assignment; and oversight and accountability. Pending the completion of this reorganization, any judicial cases during this time will be addressed through the University conduct procedures for student organizations.
