Residence hall students are required to enroll in a Marquette meal plan and are welcome to eat at any residence hall dining room, Marquette Place and all five Brew cafés. Breakfast, lunch and dinner are served at all of them, and you'll have a variety of choices at each meal. Nutritional information and vegetarian and special diet options also are available.

DINING

Quality. We choose the freshest quality ingredients, knowing that good nutrition is a vital component of a healthy lifestyle.

Variety. We have more than 15 dining locations at the residence halls, Alumni Memorial Union and Brew cafés.

Flexibility. We offer dining options from the early morning until midnight, meaning you'll always find a place that's open when you need it.

Cobeen Hall, McCormick Hall and Straz Tower offer all-you-care-to-eat menus with made-to-order homestyle favorites, international entrées and much more. Cafe Italiano at Schroeder Hall is a restaurant-style dining room with quick-serve and made-to-order Italian fare, including pizzas, pastas and other regional entrees.

Mashuda Hall is home to a 1950s-style diner that serves everything from French toast to milkshakes.

MarquetteCASH

MarquetteCASH is money on your Marquette ID.

You can charge one-time amounts of \$100 or \$500.

The \$100 option is perfect for buying snacks in vending machines, hall stores or local eateries that accept MarquetteCASH. The \$500 option can be used for larger purchases, such as textbooks.





RESIDENCE HALL ASSOCIATION

The Residence Hall Association is made up of members from each res hall and university-owned apartment building at Marquette. Members serve as liaisons between individual hall councils and RHA, attend leadership conferences, and organize campus-wide programming. RHA members are on top of the issues, too, sitting on university advisory boards that work to improve the quality of campus life. It's a great way to be connected.

If you'd like to coordinate programs or help improve campus life, you can also run for a position in residence hall government. Elections take place early in the fall semester.

SPECIALTY LIVING FLOORS

Four Marquette residence halls offer unique living options that put students with common interests together on the same floor. Dedicated study space is also available.

Engineering: three floors in Carpenter Tower; computer lab is linked to College of Engineering server

Honors Program: three floors in Straz Tower

Nursing: one floor in Cobeen Hall

CommUNITY: two wings in McCormick Hall; 70 freshmen from minority and majority cultures live together, take a seminar class together, work on leadership skills, and participate in student organizations and activities that promote diversity.





RESIDENCE HALL STAFF

Residence hall directors live and have offices in each hall. They help develop the sense of community you experience from the day you move in and lend support as you adjust to university life.

Ministers also live in the residence halls. They are lay and ordained ministers — some are Jesuits — who help students explore and develop faith.

Resident assistant positions are filled by upperclassmen. All wings of every residence hall floor have an RA.

For information about selecting your housing preferences, refer to the instructions for admitted students in your acceptance packet or download a copy at marquette.edu/nextstep. **You must complete the process by May 1, 2012.** Your application will be put in random order during the assignment process. Roommate, room type and hall preference are honored to the extent possible. If all criteria can't be accommodated, we assume that a preferred roommate is more important than living in a particular building or room type.

You'll be notified before **PREVIEW** in early June where you'll be living on campus. After that, it's time to get packing.
