The Senior Survey

The Marquette University Senior Survey 2007 was conducted as an on-line survey of the 1,300 undergraduate students graduating in May 2007. The survey, developed by the Office of the Provost and the Office for Student Development, consisted of three parts that all students answered: questions about their co-curricular activities during their education at Marquette, questions about their plans after graduation and self-ratings of their abilities learned in the Core of Common Studies. In addition a fourth section contained items developed by specific programs and completed only by students in the specific major. This report summarizes the results on the items completed by all students.

The Respondents

A total of 693 students responded yielding a strong response rate of 53%. The portion of responses received from students in each of the seven undergraduate colleges closely reflected the portion of each college's graduating seniors among the total of graduating seniors. This sample is an adequate representative sample of all 2007 graduating seniors.

Senior Survey Results

The results are presented around four basic questions reflecting different aspects of a Marquette education. Did the graduating seniors achieve the intended general learning outcomes from their core courses? How involved were these graduating seniors in co-curricular activities during their education at Marquette? How many had international experiences? Where do our seniors plan to be within six months after graduation?

I. Did students achieve the learning outcomes of the Core of Common Studies?

This question is particularly important this year as these are the first students to complete the entire "new" Core of Common Studies curriculum. Students indicated their level of agreement with statements about each learning outcome. Statements began: As the result of what I learned in my

University Core of Common Studies courses I am confident in my abilities to.... (learning outcome).

- ❖ **Most students (86% to 94%) agreed or strongly agreed that they were confident in their abilities to:**
 - Apply the knowledge and methods of various subject areas to life and work challenges.
 - Understand and effectively use both oral and written communication.
 - Respect individuals different from themselves and cultures different from their own.
 - Continually acquire new knowledge to further their understanding of the purpose of life.

- ❖ **A little over a quarter of the students (27%) indicated they were uncertain or did not have confidence in their abilities to understand and use mathematical representations.**

Unlike responses to other core learning outcomes, responses regarding mathematical abilities differed considerably by college. One hundred percent of Professional Studies 88% of Engineering seniors expressed confidence (strong agreement or agreement) in their abilities, whereas 64% of Arts and Sciences seniors and 53% of Communication seniors expressed confidence.

II. How engaged were the seniors in campus activities and leadership?

❖ **Students were very involved in campus activities and leadership.**

- Most students (90%) participated in campus activities and/or student organizations during their time at Marquette.
- Over 36% (up from 30% last year) of the students held leadership positions in student organizations.

❖ **Most Marquette seniors participated in volunteer community service and/or service learning for credit during their undergraduate years.**

- Eighty-four percent of the students participated in volunteer service activities at least once a year.
- Thirty percent participated in volunteer service once a month or more frequently.
- Over half of the seniors completed one or more service learning courses for credit.
- 30% of the seniors completed two or more service learning courses.

III. Did the seniors have international learning experiences during their studies at Marquette?

- ❖ **One-third of the seniors (up from 29% last year) participated in an international (non USA) program, experience, or travel.**
 - Twenty-one percent completed a study abroad program.
 - Four percent had international volunteer service experiences and one percent completed an international service learning course.

IV. What are the seniors' near-future plans upon graduation?

- ❖ **Over two-thirds of the seniors plan to be employed full-time.**
 - Sixty-seven percent plan to be employed full-time.
 - Three percent will be serving full-time military active duty.
 - One-third of the seniors held full-time job offers in April.
 - Five percent will be performing community service full-time in organizations such as Teach for America, the Jesuit Volunteer Corps, and the Peace Corps.

- ❖ **Nearly half (48%) of the students plan to be involved in more education within six months.**
 - Thirty-two percent planned to be engaged in full-time graduate or professional studies.
 - An additional 14% plan to be enrolled part-time in additional education.

- ❖ **A quarter of the students plan to be engaged in at least part-time volunteer community service within six months.**

Discussion

I. Use of the Senior Survey 2007 to Document Student Learning

This is the second year that the senior survey has been sent to all students as a learning assessment tool. New to the survey this year are the items in which students indicate their abilities to demonstrate the general core learning outcomes. The survey also contained 5 items specific to a given academic major. Those results were sent to the academic program and are part of each program's learning assessment data.

The aggregated results for all respondents provide assessment information directly relevant to the Marquette mission of providing a transformational education to all students. These results are useful within several limitations. Student self-report is considered an indirect measure of actual student learning (as opposed to actually observing the students and evaluating their performance). Self reports of ability are often higher than those that would be assigned by an external observer when the ability is complex or hard to

define. (Smoot, S. 2002, Eric Monograph ED481050). This effect is moderated for those items that ask for the extent of participation in courses and activities do provide direct evidence.

The following table links the Marquette Undergraduate Integrated Learning Outcomes with specific assessment findings.
