GOALS FOR EACH TRAINING SESSION

Designing your Course

1. Getting Started: Reimagining your course

- Provide a general overview of backwards design.
- Explain the importance of learning outcomes and how they guide the design process.
- Provide best practices for organizing your blended or online course.
- Explain strategies to optimize lecture materials for blended and flexible learning.
- Discuss when and why to use synchronous instruction.

2. Rethinking Learning Activities and assessments

- Highlight the importance of having activities/assessments that include peer to peer interaction.
- Discuss the differences between learning activities and assessments.
- Identify the best types of assessments for your online or blended course.
- Provide strategies for integrating active learning exercises.
- Provide examples of how to adapt a F2F assignment into an online format.
- Discuss Quizzing/Testing Strategies

3. Selecting and creating instructional materials: Copyright and Accessibility

- Review copyright and accessibility considerations and best practices as you create and select instructional materials.

4. Deciding when to use videos and synchronous sessions

- Describe best practices for using video in your course.
- Explain when and why to use video and synchronous sessions to increase student engagement.
- Discuss best practices for managing synchronous session in MS Teams (including breakout groups, recording session, netiquette).
- Explain how to reenvision your lectures incorporate active learning into lectures
- Demonstrate how to create videos and upload them to your course.

Facilitating your course

1. Engaging and empowering students

- Discuss strategies to promote the three types of engagement: (1) instructor-student, (2) student-student, and (3) student-content.
- Explain how including formative assessment increases student engagement.
- Discuss best practices for setting up course norms/netiquette
- Provide strategies for creating instructor presence.
- Discuss group activities
- Explain the importance of having variability in your course resources

2. Grading and Feedback

- Explain the difference between grading and feedback
- Discuss best practices for effective and efficient feedback.
- Identify ways to maximize your time when grading online coursework.
- Explain how to use D2L tools to provide feedback.
- Discuss the benefits of using rubrics and best practices for creating them
