# MINDFUL MARQUETTE MOVE-OUT & MOVE-IN

# **Summary**

This program will implement a more systematic approach to improve student's move-out experience that (1) facilitates an internal awareness about what the term "away" means, shifting from a throw-away culture to an agile and resourceful one; and (2) establishes a closed-loop system in which gently used items will be repurposed or reused by incoming students the following year at a move-in yard sale in August.

### **Milestones**

#### Year 1

May 2022 – collect data during move out on items disposed of and effectiveness of current communications

September 2022 - develop outreach materials and branding

October-December 2022 – secure storage and transportation for program

March 2023 - recruit student, staff and faculty volunteers

April 2023- begin promoting move-out program

May 2023 – launch pilot move-out program

August 2022 - host community move-in yard sale event

September-December 2023 – evaluate program and develop next steps for changing and scaling up

#### Year 2

March 2024 - recruit volunteers and begin setting up for scaled-up move-out program

May 2024 – launch scaled-up move out event

August 2024 -host 2<sup>nd</sup> year community move-in yard sale event

## **Beyond Boundaries**

At present, this strategic theme is highly focused on sustainability of valuable resources. This program will: (1) reduce the burden on Milwaukee's and Southeastern Wisconsin landfills which are nearing capacity; (2) position the institution as stewards of the Near West Side neighborhoods where presently there is a sense that our students come here, dump here, and then leave without any real relationship to the community they live in; and (3) provides access to affordable essential living items in a way that simultaneous protects our environment and restores a sense of dignity within our student community.
