History:

St. Andrew Cathedral is a non-Indian parish. However, diocesan priests from St. Andrew's attended the following Indian and Eskimo stations in Alaska:

1865-1888 (closed)	Nulato station (Koyukon), Yukon/ Youcon River
1881-1888 (closed)	Kodiak station (Eskimo), South of Cook Inlet, Kodiak Island
1881-1888 (closed)	Illewluk station (Indian?), Unalaska River
1881-1888 (closed)	St. Michael station (Eskimo), Behring Strait
1881-1888 (closed)	Anvik station (Eskimo and Ingalik), Yukon/ Youcon River
1881-1888 (closed)	Nuklukayat station (Indian?), Yukon/ Youcon River
1882-1886 (became a parish)	St. Rose of Lima Church (Tlingit) Fort Wrangell
1883-1886 (transferred to St. Rose of Lima, Fort Wrangell)	Sitka station (Tlingit)
1883-1886 (transferred to St. Rose of Lima, Fort Wrangell)	Takou station (Tlingit)
1883-1886 (transferred to St. Rose of Lima, Fort Wrangell)	Hootsnoo station (Tlingit)
1883-1886 (transferred to St. Rose of Lima, Fort Wrangell)	Chilcat station (Tlingit)

Holding of U.S. Native Catholic records:

Inclusive dates: 1865-1889

Volume: At least 1 volume

Holding of Catholic-related records about Native Americans in the United States are unknown. However, St. Andrew Cathedral is believed to hold sacramental records for attended Indian and Eskimo missions and stations in Alaska.
