History:

- 1598-1639 Fray Alonzo de Lugo, O.F.M. established and the Franciscans (Santo Evangelico Province, Mexico City, Mexico) administered San José de Giusewa Mission (Jemez), Jemez Springs, and San Diego de la Concepción Mission (Jemez), Jemez Pueblo/Walatowa
- 1639 San José was combined with San Diego Mission
- 1838 Residents of Pecos Pueblo consolidated with Jemez Pueblo
- 1744-1852 Franciscans reestablished and administered San Diego Mission
- 1852-1856 Diocesan priests attended San Diego from St. Dominic, Santo Domingo
- 1858-1902 Diocesan priests administered San Diego
- 1902-present Reverend Barnabas Meyer, O.F.M. and the Franciscans (formerly St. John the Baptist; now Our Lady of Guadalupe Province, Albuquerque, New Mexico) have administered San Diego; the current church was built ca. 1906 with the original mission maintained as a chapel
- 1906-1999 Sister M. Mathias Boyle, O.S.F. and the Poor Sisters of St. Francis Seraph of the Perpetual Adoration (formerly Immaculate Heart of Mary; now St. Joseph Province, Colorado Springs, Colorado) established and staffed the San Diego/Jemez Day School (Jemez)
- 1997-present The school became first an independent Catholic school named "San Diego Riverside School" and then a public charter school renamed "San Diego Riverside Charter School"

Franciscans and diocesan priests from San Diego attended the following Indian missions and school:

1856-present	St. Anne/ Santa Ana Mission (Santa Ana), Santa Ana Reservation
1858-present	Our Lady of Guadalupe Mission (Jemez), Canyon/ Cañon de Jemez, Jemez Reservation
1858-present	St. Isidore/ San Ysidro Mission (Jemez), San Ysidro
1889-1892	Zia School (Zia), Zia Pueblo, Zia Reservation
1890-present	Our Lady of the Assumption/ Neustra Señora de la Asunción Mission (Zia), Zia Reservation

Holdings of Catholic-related records about Native Americans:

Inclusive dates: 1905-present

Volume: Approximately 1.5 cubic feet

Description: Sacramental records (baptisms, first communions, confirmations, marriages, and burials) for San Diego Mission and its Indian missions; in Latin to 1930s.
