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**Holy Name Church**

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Access: Some restrictions apply

History: Holy Name Church is a non-Indian parish that included a number of Chickasaw Indian parishioners until ca. 1910s.

1898-1902	Benedictines (formerly Sacred Heart, now St. Gregory's Abbey, Shawnee, Oklahoma) established and attended Holy Name Mission (Chickasaw) from St. Patrick's, Anadarko
1899-1930s (few Indians)	Sisters of St. Francis of Philadelphia established and staffed St. Joseph School (Chickasaw), Chickasha
1902-1910s (Indians declined)	Became a parish; Diocesan priests administered Holy Name Church

Benedictines and diocesan priests from Holy Name attended the following Indian missions and stations:

1898-1909 (transferred to St. Joseph's, Union City) (no longer Indian)	Holy Rosary Mission (Chickasaw), Minco
1898-1909 (became a mission)	Marlow station (Chickasaw)
1902-1912 (transferred to Church of the Assumption, Duncan) (no longer Indian)	Lindsay station (Chickasaw and Choctaw)
1905-1909 (transferred to Church of the Assumption, Duncan) (no longer Indian)	Immaculate Conception Mission (Chickasaw), Marlow
1906-1912 (transferred to St. Joseph's, Union City) (no longer Indian)	Tuttle station (Chickasaw and Choctaw)
