History: St. Joseph Church is a non-Indian parish. However, Benedictines (now St. Gregory's Abbey, Shawnee, Oklahoma) from St. Joseph's attended the following Indian stations:

1887-1888 (transferred to St. John's, McAlester)	Eufala station (Creek)
1887-1888 (transferred to St. John's, McAlester)	Fort Gibson station (Cherokee)
1887-1888 (transferred to St. John's, McAlester)	Muskogee station (Creek)
1887-1888 (transferred to St. John's, McAlester)	South Canadian River station (Creek and Choctaw)
1887-1888 (transferred to St. John's, McAlester)	Tahlequah station (Cherokee)
1887-1888 (transferred to St. John's, McAlester)	Vinita station (Cherokee)
1889-1897 (transferred to St. Agnes, Antlers)	Choctaw Reservation station

Also, diocesan priests from St. Joseph's attended St. Paul/ Precious Blood Church, Eufala, a non-Indian parish, from which they attended the following Indian missions and stations:

1909-1925 (transferred to Assumption, Muskogee)	Checotah station (Creek)
1921-1925 (transferred to Assumption, Muskogee)	St. Mary Mission (Cherokee), Tahlequah
1921-1925 (transferred to Assumption, Muskogee)	Webber's Falls station (Cherokee)
1941-1942 (transferred to Holy Cross, Wagoner)	Tahlequah station (Cherokee)
1941-1942 (transferred to Holy Cross, Wagoner)	St. Joseph Mission (Cherokee), Webber's Falls
