Education Abroad

During the global pandemic Marquette continued to offer education abroad programs in more than 15 different countries on 5 continents. Of Marquette's 2021 graduating class, 22% participated in an international experience. The following numbers include summer, fall, J-term, spring break and academic year student participation on credit-bearing and non-credit programs abroad. The overall numbers and statistics are down due to the global pandemic, the education abroad programs are moving forward successfully, and student enrollment is slowly beginning to increase back to pre-pandemic numbers.
