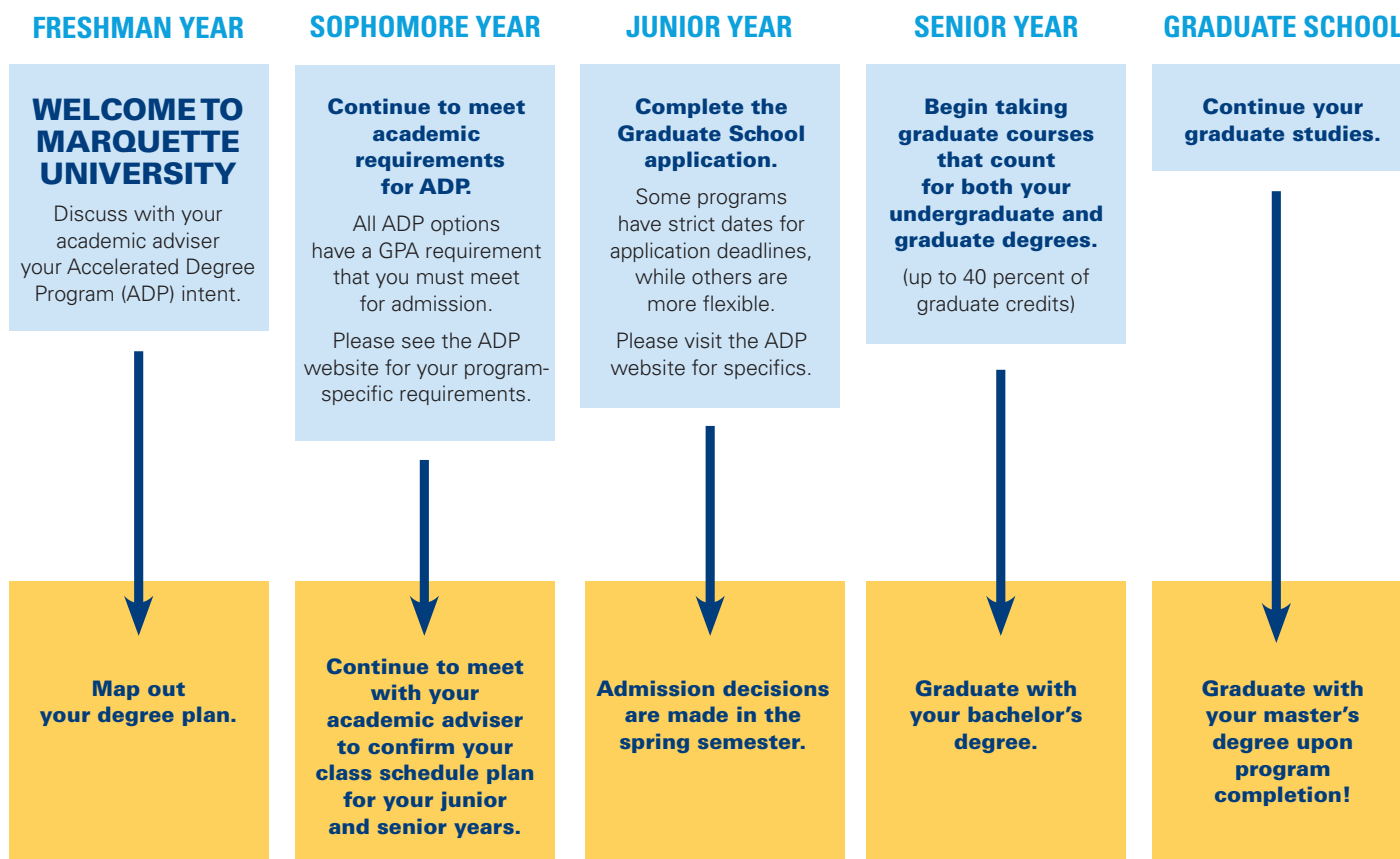

Career Counseling

Whether you know your exact career path or are completely unsure of what you will do after graduation, the Career Services Center can assist you. Meeting with a Career Counselor can help you make educated decisions about your major choice and identify career possibilities through the process of getting to know yourself and the world of work. Career Counselors can also assist with resume and cover letter development, strategies for obtaining an internship or job, practice interviewing, salary negotiation, graduate school decision making and preparation, post-graduate services consideration, and other career concerns.

Career Presentations and Workshops

Career counselors, advisors, and interns are available to deliver presentations to groups and classes on a variety of career-related topics. From a five minute “pop-in” to a 90-minute workshop, we deliver specialized content to fit your needs. Complete an online presentation request form at least two weeks in advance. Common topics include Career Services Overview, Internship/Job Search Strategies, Resume/Cover Letter Writing, Career Fair Preparation, Interviewing Preparation, Major/Career Exploration, Handshake Overview, and LinkedIn Overview.

Career Course Offering: Career Exploration (MARQ 1040)

This course is directed at first and second year students who are deciding on a major and exploring career opportunities.

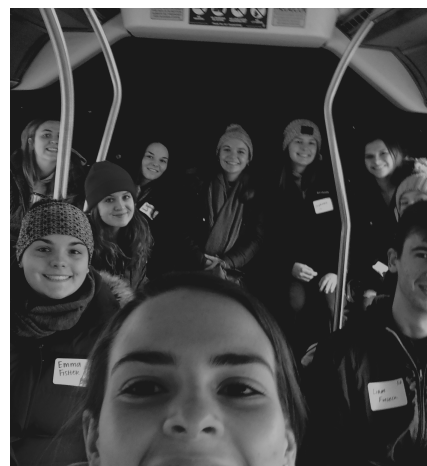

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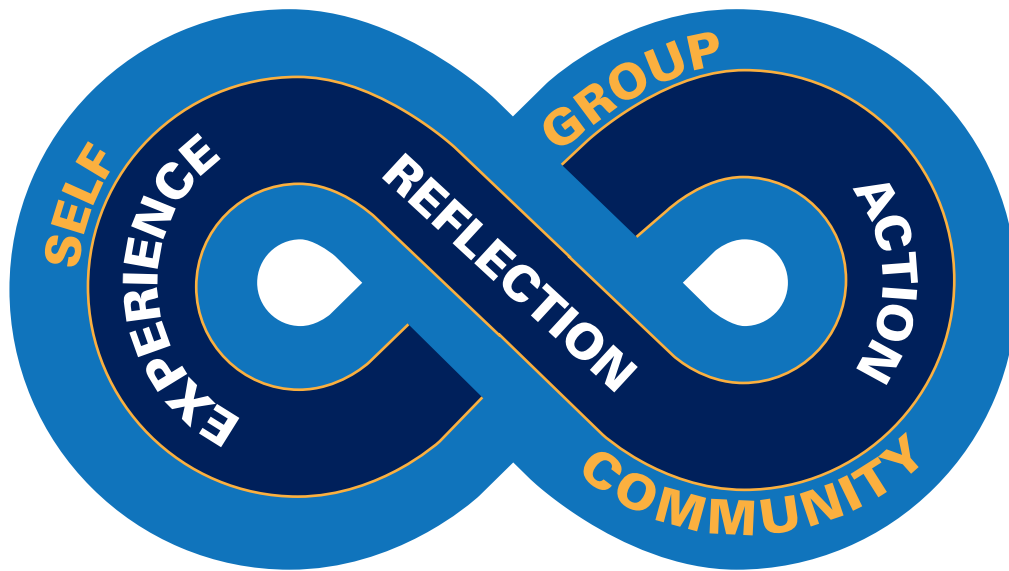
Contemplatives in Action

We do this by helping students become “Contemplatives in Action” who engage in the Ignatian practice of prayer, reflection, and discernment in the context of their ongoing faith and value formation.

Marquette graduates will humbly encounter the world as Contemplatives in Action. These reflective leaders respond to the wisdom in their lived experiences. In spending time in discernment and prayer, they will choose action that contributes to the work of justice for the Greater Glory of God. An active life feeds a contemplative life.



Self—Group—Community

Marquette leaders recognize their gifts and talents and see themselves as loved individuals. Through the recognition of the self as a loved person, one is able to be in community with others.

Experience—Reflection—Action

Leadership starts from within. Members of our community have rich and diverse lived experiences, unique to each individual. A Contemplative in Action spends time in self-reflection and discernment to look within and make sense of their experiences. Leaders then take action for the greater good, informed by this reflection and the movements of the soul.

Given student development and leadership theories, we know that persons are in continual development (we are always becoming). The ellipsis represents this continual movement. People are transformed because of encountering this contemplative in action process.

The Kleczka Internship Program

MILWAUKEE

Do more than learn about public policy — see it in the making while getting professional job experience. The Kleczka Internship Program provides Marquette students firsthand experience in public service, so they can help improve the Milwaukee communities and the systems that support them.

GAIN EXPERIENCE

The Kleczka Internship Program connects students with internship opportunities throughout the city of Milwaukee. Whether it's federal, state or local government, or nonprofit institutions, our students work in a variety of offices across a number of disciplines.

Examples include:

- Mayor, City of Milwaukee
- Milwaukee County District Attorney
- Neighborhood Economic Development Associations
- United States Senator

While the placement organizations benefit from an infusion of energy and talent from our students, the students themselves will obtain valuable professional experience.

EARN CREDITS

In addition to working in the city, students take part in a three-credit course meant to supplement the internship experience. Advisers will ensure students receive the credits they need as a part of their Kleczka experience.

The internship is open to any eligible Marquette student studying any major with a minimum GPA of 2.5 on a 4.0 scale. In fact, we'll help tailor your experience to your interests. Qualifying students may earn a \$2,000 stipend for their internships.

The Marquette University Medical Clinic provides quality healthcare, prevention and education. We are just like your primary care doctor's office at home.

HEALTH SERVICE COVERAGE

Full-time undergraduate students are assessed a health fee each semester as part of their tuition and student fees. Annual health service coverage begins two weeks prior to fall classes commencing and continues through the following summer. This entitles students to free core services and laboratory studies and reduced prices on non-core services. Additional fees may apply for medications, lab tests, intravenous fluids, vaccines or orthopedic supplies.

- Men's health care and women's health care

We maintain the highest levels of confidentiality in accordance with HIPAA standards. We will not make any disclosures of your health information (to your parents, your teachers, or anyone else) unless you sign a written Authorization to Disclose Medical Information form, which is available on our website or at the front desk.

Call NurseDirect at (855) 839-5121 or 1 (800) 362-9900. This after-hours nurse line is available when the MU Medical Clinic is closed and is free of charge for all Marquette students. Students calling NurseDirect will be able to speak with a registered nurse, ask health and medical questions, and have their concerns addressed in a confidential manner.

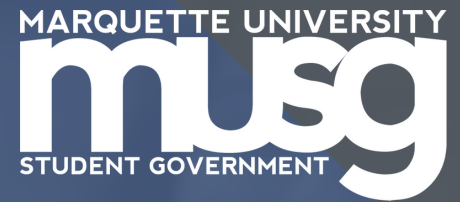

Campus Safety provides free, mobile transportation as a means of strengthening the safety of the university community and its members. The LIMO (local intercampus mobile operations) program has various door-to-door, full-sized vans, and LIMO EXPRESS mini buses operated by trained

student employees. The LIMOs provide free, safe transportation within a large service area around the on-campus and near off-campus neighborhood.

busses are currently replacing our regular LIMO service during the academic year. They operate nightly from 5 p.m. until 3 a.m. The busses follow a set path through campus and can be tracked using the EagleEye App.

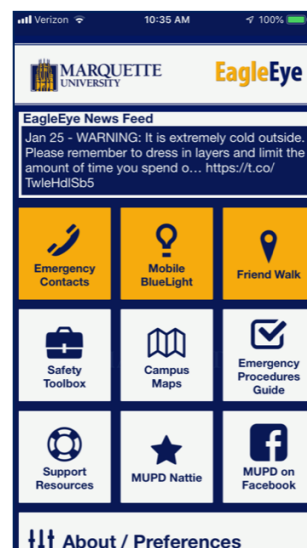
Blue Light Phones & EagleEye App

To provide members of the Marquette and surrounding community with a direct means of contacting the MU Police Department, the university maintains over 450 Blue Light Phones. Blue Light Phones, most frequently recognized by the blue lights on the top of the phones, are placed through university buildings, sidewalks, apartments, parking areas, and the near off-campus areas.



Blue Light Phones can be activated by either lifting the phone receiver or pushing the

red intercom button located within the phone's boxes. Upon activation of a Blue Light Phone, the communications officer can immediately identify the caller's location and will provide the appropriate assistance. Blue Light Phones can be used to request directions, request a LIMO, report suspicious behavior or if you are the victim of or witness a crime.



EagleEye is MUPD's free safety app. The EagleEye app features a mobile BlueLight feature, which allows users to press a button that connects them directly to MUPD and sends the device's location in real-time, as long as location services are turned on. The app also includes features for using Campus Safety services, emergency contact numbers, and friend walk. The university encourages all students, faculty, and staff to download EagleEye as an added layer of security.

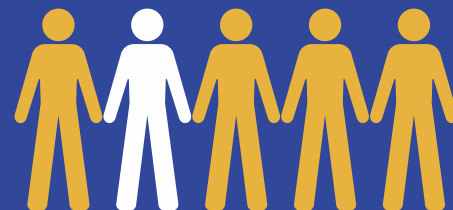

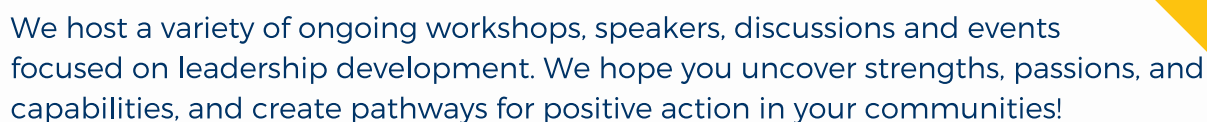

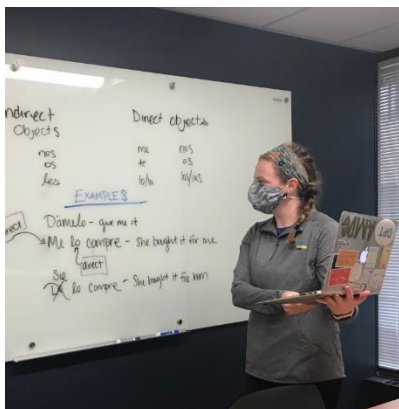
TUTORING

Our Tutoring Program is certified through the CRLA International Tutor Training Program. We base our program on a group tutoring philosophy where students meet weekly with a trained tutor and group of peers to discuss material and review questions. We offer approximately 400 group tutoring sessions per week and serve 50% of the freshman class. Tutoring sessions occur either in person or virtually depending on University guidelines.

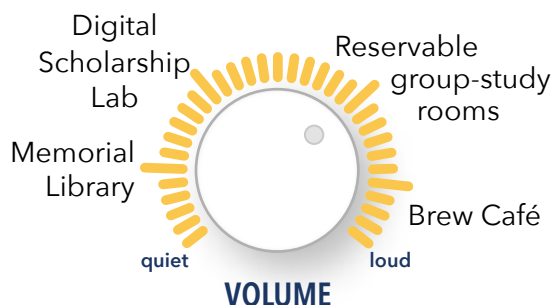

- **Federal W-4:** Employee Withholding Allowance Certificate
- Sign a statement acknowledging **Hazard Communication** training

Note: Original documents must be presented for proof of citizenship/employment eligibility. Per federal law, copies cannot be accepted.

F1 or J1 Visa students must provide additional information, this information can be found on our website.

A GLIMPSE OF STUDENT EMPLOYMENT

Student employment contributes to the comprehensive development of students by adding to the multi-faceted experiences students have at Marquette University.

Earning money to help with costs of an education is one of the many benefits students gain through campus employment. Good work habits, skills, time management, emotional maturity, personal identity and integrity are also fostered through college work experiences.

A student employee is defined as anyone employed by Marquette University whose **primary purpose for being at the University is to obtain an education.**

It is Marquette University's position that student employees work **no more than 20 hours per week** when classes are in session.

PAYMENT AND SCHEDULES

Payment:

Position wages are based on the duties and skills required, and your experience. Students are paid **every two weeks** for hours worked through university employment. Non-university employers set their own wage rates and payment schedules.

Student employment earnings are not directly credited to your student account.

You may use your earnings to pay your balance or for personal expenses related to your education. Students can find instructions on setting up **Direct Deposit** in CheckMarq, under the "Student Account" tab in Quick Links.

Work Schedules:

Student work schedules are based upon the employer's needs and the student's academic schedule. Students should discuss their schedule with their employers during interviews. Employers will make every attempt to accommodate students' needs but might not be able to schedule students for evening or weekend employment.

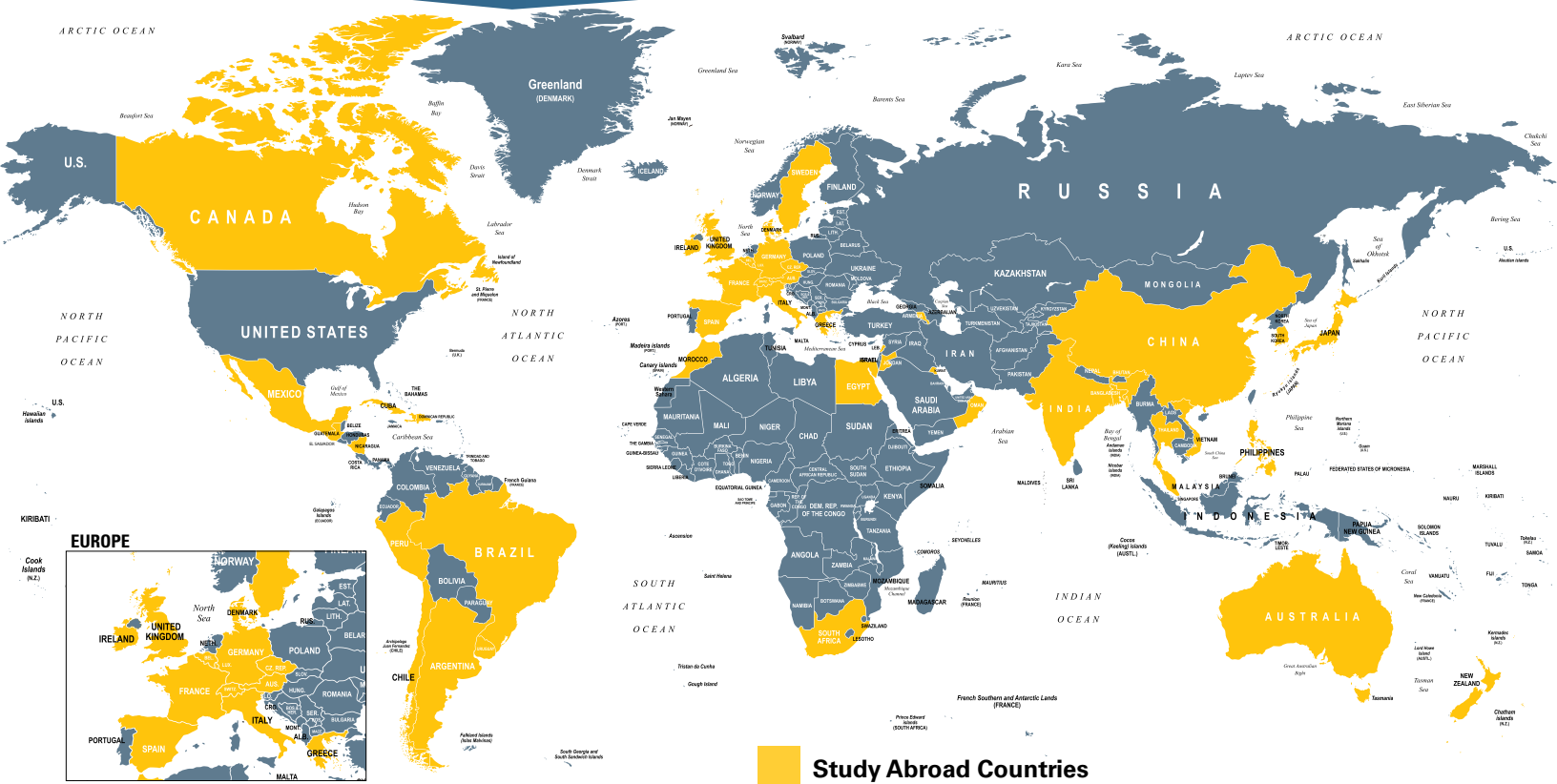

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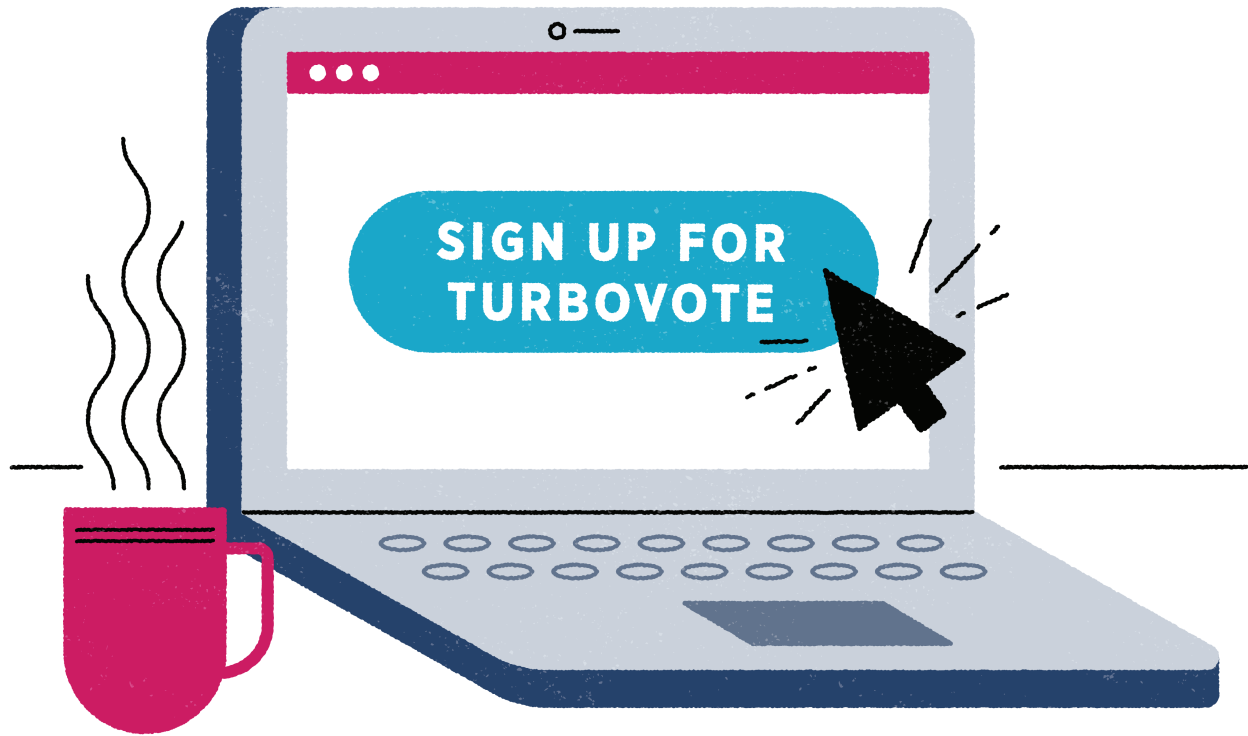
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
